He instructed these two churches, located only a few miles apart, to network in this way: "After this letter has been read to you, see that it is also read in the church of the Laodiceans and that you in turn read the letter from Laodicea" (Colossians 4:16). Churches sharing information and resources. Sounds like networking to me!

Throughout our ministry, DHF has encouraged churches and pastors

to network with each other.
This has been done through
national conferences and
regional events, joint
missions participation
and online pastoral
studies. A recent

major networking effort has been our Ukrainian outreach. This effort (detailed more fully by Wayne Kent on page 2) has blessed, and will bless many for years to come.

A newer expression of DHF networking is the Spiritual Health Checkups. This, explained more fully by Pastor Joe Ensley on page 3, is where two or three outside pastors spend time with a local church, conducting interviews with leaders and members to get the pulse of the congregation and offer feedback. This checkup can affirm what is going well in the church, but also serve as a "blind spot indicator" to help congregations see what they are not seeing themselves.

I am excited about how DHF is providing needed networking opportunities for pastors and for churches. Perhaps what you have learned is just what the Laodicea up the road needs to hear and vice versa. We are in this together, let's continue to grow this network known as the Disciple Heritage Fellowship.

MISSION: UHRAINE

Her name is Irena. She was dressed elegantly, her hair neatly arranged and make up done. She appeared to be in her late sixties. And she had a story to tell.

Irena and her husband were in Warsaw, Poland. They are Ukrainian refugees fleeing the Russian invasion. They had a home in Mariopol, Ukraine, but it is gone — shelled beyond habitation. They bunkered down in the basement for more than three months early in the war, as Russian shelling obliterated their city. They would climb the stairs out into the sunlight for a few minutes daily, simply to see the sky. Nothing was left.

After three months of hiding, they walked out of the city, passing the bodies of children with arms and legs torn off by bombs. One man bled to death in front of them with both legs severed by an explosion.

Our group listened in horror as Irena told her story.

A congregation in southern Warsaw is providing food and a place to stay for Irena and her husband. In fact, they are providing meals for more than 100 war refugees a day — in addition to housing and clothing many of them.

The Warsaw congregation is fearful about the upcoming winter. The winter will bring unbearable cold to the flattened Ukrainian homes and basements without electricity or gas for heating and cooking. Many from eastern Ukraine will cross into Poland, some traveling more than 500 miles. Most entering Poland will be women and children. They will leave their fathers, husbands, and adult sons behind — men who are not allowed to leave Ukraine for the war effort. The congregation wonders if their ministry funding will continue. Can their volunteer teams continue?

Irena's story is one of many stories heard by DHF representatives while on a Discovery Tour of Poland in September 2022. Those on the discovery team were sent by their individual congregations, looking for settings where good stewardship practices are in place. Several DHF congregations contributed to a relief fund for Ukrainian refugees.

After reviewing places where needs are being met, we have a plan for helping these refugees in the months ahead. DHF has partners on the ground, involved in credible and authentic ministry to people in desperate need.

Spiritual Health Checkup

Pastors and church leaders face unique and challenging responsibilities and questions. Is your church growing? Is that growth good? What if it's not growing? If you are like me, this question keeps popping up: "What in the world must God be thinking of all this?"

Like most churches, the church I pastor has been through ups and downs in its journey. As our leadership team prayed about how to continue to grow forward well, we realized we need to "know what we didn't know." Thankfully, God provided a type of "blind spot indicator" for us in the form of a spiritual health check with DHF. After speaking with Dr. Rick Grace detailing how he and some other pastors had provided this service to churches in the past, I knew I wanted it at my church. And let me tell you, I was not disappointed!

In September 2022, Dr. Grace teamed with Pastor Michael Ten Eyck to provide a spiritual health check of our church. This was slightly complicated by a COVID diagnosis, but creativity and perseverance prevailed. Over the course of two days, these men interviewed 15 people, surveyed our processes and building, and observed our operations. Then, they presented a report explaining their methodology, affirmations, concerns, and recommendations for future action and adjustments. It was a priceless gift to our leadership team and encouraging

and helpful to me as the pastor. And as a church, it was a muchneeded outside perspective helping us to be intentional as we grow forward well.

This spiritual health check provided a framework for those questions and pointed our leadership team in the right direction to find the answers. I don't want to mislead anyone so let me say this: it is a vulnerable process! But it is vulnerable in the way I think Jesus was with His disciples — real conversations about real issues initiated from a heart of love.

I don't know what kind of shape your church is in, but I know anyone who wants to live a healthy life has regular medical checkups on their body. And this process is much like asking a doctor to give a few spiritual vital signs for a church. As someone who loves his flock, I was blessed by this "checkup" and inspired and hopeful about healthy years to come.
